Chair Shouse called the meeting to order at 11:25 a.m. and welcomed members of the board, staff, and honorable guests. Chair Shouse announced that in accordance with the Freedom of Information

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Act, the press had been notified of the meeting. Chair Shouse acknowledged that the agenda was posted on the GTC website and a quorum of board members was present.

Chair Shouse thanked County Council and Delegation members for their continued support of the college, staff, and board.

Chair Shouse thanked Dr. Miller and the executive staff for their leadership and accomplishments and turned the meeting over to Dr. Miller for the college update.

Dr. Miller expressed his appreciation to County Council, Delegation, staff and board members.

Dr. Miller, Ms. Wright, Dr. Whirl, and Dr. Knowles provided an update on the challenges and opportunities to creating the college's future and answered questions. See Attachment 1.

Specific for delegation attention, Dr. Miller referenced the SC Technical College System FY2020-21 Budget Request highlighting the number one priority of Base Funding for the Local Colleges (\$28M Recurring).

Specific for County Council attention, Dr. Miller indicated the college's immediate facility need is a new University Transfer Building (\$50-55 million project). The three-story building is 50 years old and has been renovated many times. The challenges are that the labs and classrooms are outdated, the teaching technology is unavailable, the elevator is unreliable, and the building creates a negative impression. The current building houses the majority of the general education classes with approximately 89,000 student visits a year for class, labs, etc.

The meeting adjourned at 12:30 p.m. for a brief recess.

Chair Shouse called the meeting back to order at 12:39 p.m.

Approval of the Minutes

Mr. Howard made a motion to approve the November 20, 2019 Minutes. Mr. Southerlin seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Finance Report

Mr. Southerlin referred the board to the November financial report in the board packet and asked Ms. DiMaggio to present the report. See Attachment 2.

SCATCC

Chair Shouse provided the SCATCC update.

- The SC Technical College System FY2020-21 Budget Request is the high priority.
- The Commissioners' Academy is scheduled for February 2020.
- The board will highlight a different college at each board meeting. Greenville Tech will be highlighted at the March meeting.

CHE

Mr. Batson provided the CHE update.

- Approved approximately 20 new programs.
- Thoroughly vetted and approved approximately \$200 million in capital projects.
- Approved regulatory changes regarding scholarships and awards, particularly with DACA students.

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- There will be a Council of Presidents meeting in January to determine the value of convening the whole group in South Carolina in an independent manner, and the council will continue to meet to discuss higher education issues for legislative pursuit.

Old and New Business









Student Revenues




County Revenues








EXPENSES BY TYPE NOVEMBER 30 YTD




