Chair Lattimore called the meeting to order at 12:10 p.m. and welcomed board members, staff, and guests. Chair Lattimore announced that the press had been notified of the meeting in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act. Chair Lattimore acknowledged that the agenda was posted on the GTC website, and a quorum of board members was present.

### **Approval of Minutes**

Mr. Southerlin made a motion to approve the November 15, 2023, board minutes. Mr. Stafford seconded the motion. The motion carried.

### **Mission and Vision Statement**

Chair Lattimore stated that SACSCOC requires the college to review the Mission and Vision Statement each year. Chair Lattimore asked Vice Chair Jo Hackl to present the college's Mission and Vision Statement. Ms. Hackl and Mr. Southerlin suggested a minor change under Role and Scope, fourth

paragraph, second sentence, to change the verbiage from "the majority of GTC graduates" to "the overwhelming majority of GTC students". Ms. Hackl made a motion to approve the Mission and Vision Statement as presented with the one amendment to the Role and Scope. Mr. Southerlin seconded the motion. The motion carried. Ms. Simer will make the change and submit it to the Commission on Higher Education

### **Finance Report**

Mr. Southerlin asked Ms. DiMaggio to provide the financial report. The full report is attached.

### **Audit Committee Report**

Mr. Howard stated the Audit Committee met before the meeting with reports from Mr. Artie Hammond (internal auditor) on the 2024 risk assessment plan, Mr. George Abraham (chief information officer) on cybersecurity, and Ms. DiMaggio (vice president of finance) on security assessment and staffing. Mr. Abraham was asked to provide the cybersecurity update at the February Joint Retreat for the GTC Board and GT Foundation Board.

### **President's Report**

President Miller provided the following highlights.

- The college had 263 students who participated in the 2023 December commencement ceremony. The actual number of awards granted was 1,224 with approximately 1,099 graduates to date.
- The college recently found out that GTC serves more students through dual enrollment than any other college in the state.
- Facilities coming online over the next several years
  - 1) The Center for Workforce Development with a welding focus will be located at the Brashier Campus. With the help of local legislators, funding has been identified and is now at the state approval level. Benchmarking is currently underway.
  - 2) The Center for Industrial Analytics and Cybersecurity funding will come in this fiscal year's budget. The internal process and benchmarking are underway.

At the request of Mr. Sudduth, President Miller provided clarification on the role of our legislative liaisons. Mr. Bedingfield and Mr. Thordahl participated via Zoom.

Mr. Bedingfield is the college's director of governmental affairs and pays attention to happenings in Columbia, at the federal level, and the local level. Mr. Bedingfield has direct contact with members of the County Council, members of the legislative delegation, and the congressional delegation. Part of his responsibility is educating those members on what would be beneficial or a concern for the college regarding the state or proposed bills.

Mr. Thordahl is a registered lobbyist with Copper Dome Strategies and can ask legislators to support, oppose, or propose a bill. Mr. Thordahl's knowledge of the inner workings and staff contacts in the legislative offices and other state boards is crucial. Mr. Thordahl is funded through the Greenville Tech Foundation on a contractual basis.

Together, Mr. Bedingfield and Mr. Thordahl make a good team because each brings knowledge of the members and staff locally, statewide, and nationally. Each brings a unique perspective and a unique set of skills.

The board requested a copy of the new transfer agreement recently signed between all South Carolina public four-year institutions and the State Tech College System. More details will be shared at the February Joint Board Retreat.

### **SCATCC Update**

Mr. Shouse provided an update on the SCATCC.

- Reminder of the Day of Learning for Commissioners on January 31, 2024, in Columbia.
- As a follow-up to President Miller's legislative liaison item, SCATCC hires a full-time lobbyist for the technical colleges and the State Tech System, Mr. Billy Routh with Copper Dome Strategies. Mr. Routh works primarily during the legislative sessions for the State Tech System, its program, and its asks and is funded through state technical college dues.
- One of SCATCC's primary focuses this year is to encourage the approximately 160 commissioners to be more politically engaged with elected officials.

### **CHE Update**

Mr. Batson provided a CHE update.

- Transfer agreements CHE was charged by the legislature to come up with these agreements and get people to sit down together to make the agreements. The technical colleges have already been involved with Clemson and the University of South Carolina. The whole idea is for there to be a universal transfer in the state.
- CHE continues to do work on approving projects and programs; however, in December, a report was made by the State Inspector General's Office. There was an investigation into complaints made to the State Inspector General regarding the management of CHE. A negative report was delivered in mid-December. The commissioners are meeting on January 18, 2024, to discuss a lot of follow-up on all of the issues, including the executive director.
- Mr. Rusty Mulholland, president and executive director for CHE, turned in his notice of retirement.

### **Old and New Business**

Chair Lattimore asked Mr. Shouse to provide a brief update on the new ad-hoc committee formed to look at the McAlister Square project. The idea of the committee was how to convert the 50 acres that McAlister Square sits on into an income-producing property that could support the Greenville Tech Foundation and other activities of the college. However, several challenges with covenants affect all of the property. Mr. Shouse had a phone conversation with the attorney involved when the center was sold to a corporation out of Connecticut. There will be another conversation when it is determined how to get Publix settled.

There being no other business, Chair Lattimore adjourned the meeting at 1:09 p.m.

Greenville Technical College is one of the largest public two-year colleges in South Carolina. The college provides exceptional learning opportunities primarily to the residents of Greenville County.

Curricular offerings include (1) certificates, diplomas and associate degrees in business, computer technology, health sciences, engineering technologies, advanced manufacturing technologies, and public service; and (2) university transfer courses, associate degrees, and (3) an Applied Baccalaureate in Advanced Manufacturing Technology.

The college also provides an extensive offering of continuing education courses for occupational advancement, change of career opportunities, entry-level career training, and personal interest, as well as economic development services that encourage business and industrial growth in a diverse economic community.

The college offers an array of transitional courses to serve academically under-prepared students seeking to enter a program of study. Upon completion of their educational goals, the majority of GTC graduates are either employed in fields related to their programs of study or transfer to four-year colleges and universities.

Since Greenville Technical College is an open admission institution, students come from diverse socioeconomic and educational backgrounds. The college provides an affordable education through traditional and distance learning delivery methods for flexibility in scheduling times and locations convenient to students.

GTC faculty and staff are student-centered, accessible, and highly recognized in their fields. The college offers various educational support services to facilitate the teaching/learning process and to enhance the academic and personal development for all students including an emphasis on articulation with local high schools and other colleges and universities.






### Budgeted and YTD Revenues and Expenses




# Revenues by Month




### **EXPENSES BY MONTH**

### **Fundraising**

- Fundraising Summary: 1,421 gifts totaling \$3,263,134; 59% of \$5,500,000 goal.
- 136 new donors totaling \$317,630 in donations.
- Unrestricted revenue \$251,033; 83% of \$300,000 goal as of November 2023
